TYRONE FIELDTRIP, 17th – 18th MAY 2008

Tyrone Fieldtrip NEW PROGRAMME DETAILS

It now looks like we will be able to visit Curraghinalt Mine, but on the Sunday afternoon. The afternoon's meeting points have been interchanged, and will probably be as revised below. If you are planning to join the tour in the afternoons, please check the details with the coordinator nearer the time. In addition to hard hats and safety wellingtons, waterproof trousers/leggings are recommended for the Curraghinalt visit.

The mineral wealth of Co. Tyrone

This fieldtrip will explore Irelands only working gold mine (open pit), small workings for lead and iron, collieries and associated canals.

In a slight departure from normal engineering / geology type visits we will also tour Lissan House, near Cookstown: the home of the Staples family for almost 400 years, since 1620. The family were involved in iron and coal mining. Forges on the estate provided the pikes for Sir Phelim O'Neills uprising of 1641, and made the chains for the boom that prevented ships relieving Derry during the siege of 1689.

The House features a spectacular oak staircase, a hydropower plant, water gardens and a bridge designed by Daviso de Arcort, the engineer behind the tub boat canal at Coalisland.

There is also the rare opportunity of a visit to the trial gold working at Curraghinalt (underground).

Members are requested to bring safety wellingtons, hard hats and hi-viz jackets for the open-pit visit (A limited stock of these items will be available), and lamps for underground visits.

Lunches should be available in Gortin, Cookstown or elsewhere.

SLIGO FIELDTRIP 19TH - 20TH MAY 2008

Mick Carragher has kindly offered to coordinate visits to Benbulben and Abbeytown Mine, immediately after the Tyrone fieldtrip. Benbulben Mine is spectacularly situated on a mountain ridge between Glencar Lough and the Gleniff valley. From 1875 to 1979 barytes was produced from a vertical vein averaging 1.2 metres in thickness.

Abbeytown Mine lies on the south side of Ballysodare Bay, and intermittently produced an estimated 1.1 million tons of zinc, lead and silver ore from the 1500s to 1961. The entrance to Abbeytown Mine is located within a working quarry and the following is required: safety wellingtons, helmet, light, hi-viz vest /jacket, and valid BCA insurance card. There may be a restriction on numbers able to visit Abbeytown, and members are asked to book their place with the coordinator.

COPPER COAST NEWS – INCLUDING OFFER OF A FUTURE HOME FOR MHTI ARCHIVES

The Copper Coast Geopark has recently acquired the old church at Knockmahon, which played a pivital role in the social development of the community during the period when mining was active. Conservation work is currently under way at the church, and it is intended to build an extension to the north of the building. The extension will provide a wide range of facilities including Bistro, meeting rooms, interretation centre etc. Plans drawn up include a library and separate study area. The library will house key records and archival material for the area and beyond; with Des Cowman, John Morris and others including GSI making generous contributions. At the recent MHTI AGM the offer was made to provide a permanent and secure home for the MHTI archives within the library of the new Copper Coast Geopark building. It is also intended to build up a genaeology centre for mining related diaspora, this along with the MHTI archives would provide the Copper Coast Geopark with a link to the mining history of our island, tracing the workforce to and from each mining area. As the church has a history closely linked to the mining of the area it should prove be a good resting place for the archives!

The Copper Coast Geopark Toursim group have united with the other social groups in Bonmahon and are in the early stages of organising an Gala Day in the village of Bonmahon durning the Augast bank hoilday week. This is an ideal opportunity to introduce the old church as the new centre for the Geopark and as a community facility, bringing back the role in social development it once had. On this day the village will come alive again with activies, music, BBQ, but all with a sense of days gone by.

REPORT ON FIELD TRIP, 19TH APRIL, 2008 TO CASTLECOMER DISCOVERY PARK and DUNMORE CAVE

Fourteen members of the MHTI and Irish Geological Association met at the Castlecomer Discovery Park. The park is based around the old Prior-Wandesforde Estate yard which has been restored to a high standard, with a cafe, visitor centre and craft shops. After a coffee in the excellent Jarrow Cafe we toured the visitor centre. The "Footprints in Coal" exhibition uses dioramas, slides, photographs and sound recordings to describe life in the Carboniferous period (300 million years ago), the formation of coal, and local coal mining.



An excellent use of a semi-silvered mirror allowed one to superimpose a model of a small amphibian on its fossil. The diorama of the Carboniferous jungle could be described as inspirational. After touring the centre many members walked around the Lower Lake, stopping to admire a couple of (ornamental?) tunnels. As the visitor centre is not on a mine-site, a guidebook would be handy for people who want to see the nearby mines.

The next stop was Dunmore Cave, which is mentioned as Dearc Fearna (Cave of the Alders) in the ninth century Irish Triads, and in the Annals of the Four Masters. The latter text describes a viking attack on the caves. This has been substantiated by the discovery of the bones of at least 44 people in the cave, along with viking silver coins.

Access to the cave is via a new visitor centre, complete with a pavement of stone slabs from a variety of Irish sources. After an interesting audio-visual presentation, a guide led us around the 200 metres of publically accessible passage which now have LED lights and a new spiral staircase to access the "Town Hall". The high point of the tour is the "Market Cross", a pillar-like stalagmite 5 m high and 1.3 m in diameter. After returning to ground level and posing for a group photograph, we went our separate ways. Many thanks to Susan Pyne (IGA) for organising the visits and the bus transport from Dublin.

SILVERMINES

Conservation work is presently being undertaken on some of the historic mine buildings at Silvermines, Co. Tipperary. The works are being concentrated on the most important C19th buildings including the Cornish engine house at Ballygown, the calamine works at Ballygown and the Cornish engine house and crusher house at Shallee. Excavation of the small engine house adjacent to the calamine works has revealed that this was probably contained a small enclosed rotary engine; similar to that at Levant mine in Cornwall. The purpose of this engine is unclear; it might have driven air bellows or crushers in the calamine works. Another interesting finding is the presence of a back bob-wall on the engine house at Shallee. It would appear that the primary bob drove the crusher and stamps (see photograph in last MHTI journal No 7), whilst the back bob might have driven flat rods to pumps in the engine

The works at Silvermines are being undertaken by the Irish company Interclean and are financed jointly by North Tipperary County Council and the InterReg Green Mines Project
