Mining Heritage Trust of Ireland AGM

This year's AGM (to be held 25th and 26th May 2013), centred around the Silvermines District in Co. Tipperary, promises to be a memorable weekend. In addition to the business aspects of the meeting we have planned an exciting series of events around the theme of Medieval Silver mining. Silver and lead mining during this period is well documented in many parts of Europe (including Norway, Saxony, the Tirol, the Czech and Slovak Republics, the Balkans, and in the UK). In Ireland documentary evidence points to the antiquity of silver mining during the medieval period at Silvermines and at Barrystown (in Wexford), and recent scientific analysis of a peat core sample at Glendalough in Co. Wicklow has determined the presence of lead, indicating the intriguing possibility of silver-lead mining from the C11th onwards. In light of the growing awareness of Medieval mining in Ireland we are delighted to announce that leading expert, Dr. Peter Claughton of Exeter University, will give a keynote talk at the AGM (Saturday 26th) on Medieval silver mining and smelting in Europe. Peter will set in context the known Medieval silver workings in Ireland and give us some clues of the types of features we should be looking for in the field that give

indications of additional lead mining and smelting sites from this period. In addition, there will be supporting talks by Dr John Morris who oversaw the recent conservation works to the nineteenth century engine houses at Silvermines, and by the local historical group which has just published a history of Silvermines. On the Sunday there will be a surface walk around Silvermines guided by Peter with the aim of seeking any visual remains which might be related to Medieval mining. We will also have the opportunity to examine the restoration work to the nineteenth century mining remains and John will be on hand to answer any questions in the field. Subject to State permission, we will be organising an underground tour of the Shallee mine workings led by Dr Martin Critchley.

Report of Slieveardagh Fieldtrip Saturday 9 – Sunday 10 March 2013

MHTI last visited the Slieveardagh Coalfield in April 2007, jointly with the Industrial Heritage Association of Ireland. Since then we have visited coalfields in Ulster, Leinster and Connacht, and we were eagerly awaiting a return visit to this area of Munster. Once again our guide for the weekend was Phelim Lally, who works with the Geological Survey of Ireland (GSI).

On a wintry morning we were welcomed, with a cup of tea, to the Old School in Commons village in the Slieveardagh Hills. The school was built in 1877 by the Mining Company of Ireland (MCI), and it is now a vibrant community centre with a display of mining artefacts and memorabilia on the first floor (See Newsletter 56, June 2012).

Our first visit was to Commons Colliery a short walk away through a picturesque arch into a yard area. Nearby was the managers house, an open shaft and an engine house with a collapsing roof. The latter building probably housed an engine with a horizontal cylinder that drove horizontal rods to transmit power to two nearby shafts. This mine last worked in 1897.

The next visit was to Gorteen Mine which worked until about 1980. The mine was on a very different scale, with a large spoil heap and a large concrete gantry which had housed a coal screening and washing plant, stores, workshops and baths. Members and guests were able to see the entrance to the decline tunnel, and evidence of the spontaneous combustion of coal fines (duff) in the spoil.

After an excellent lunch of soup, sandwiches and home-baking at the Old School, we visited Mardyke Colliery, developed by the MCI after 1825. The company built engine houses, offices and housing to form the first mine village in Ireland. Sadly time has taken its toll on the village, but the offices survive along with an engine house and chimney.

Our next visit was to Maingans Road at Broomhill, which had just been opened for us. The 150m long tunnel followed by stooping and crawling sections gave many of us a feeling for what life was like for the local coal miners.

The final visit on the Saturday was to the Ballynunty Adit and nearby air-shaft. The adit drains a large area of the coalfield up to Lickfinn and Foilacamin Mines. Members explored the adit for a short distance.

More wintry weather awaited us on the Sunday morning. Our first visit was to the Decline at Lickfinn Mine. The entrance portal had been backfilled but access to the tunnel was possible through a manhole and short shaft.

Equipped with a gas monitor people descended towards the workings for several hundred meters. Unfortunately there was a low oxygen level in the mine (19%), the gas monitor alarmed, and we had to retreat to surface. On a future visit it would be best to ventilate the mine for longer before the visit, and have a much smaller group entering the mine.

Next we visited Earlshill Colliery which shut in 1881. The site includes a chimney, managers house and a very picturesque magazine.

After another lovely lunch we visited the engine house and chimney at Lisnamrock Mine. The mine ceased working in 1894. Possibly the most impressive structure of the weekend was the chimney or "Steeple" at Copper Mine, Ballingarry. This was built for ventilation purposes, but was never connected to any workings. It may have been a folly, built to create employment.

The final visit of the weekend was to Foilacamin Mine, where there is a stone-built shaft head, on which, originally, a winder was mounted. This shaft was used for pumping until the 1980s.

During lunch on Sunday, we had watched a short, locally produced, animated film about mining, called "T'was a terrible hard work". After lunch we were priviledged to see where and how the animations were made. The film won Best Animation at the 2010 Fastnet Short Film Festival.

Inspite of the weather, this was a fantastic weekend. The mine sites were interesting and impressive, our guide was very knowledgeable and organised, our handouts informative, the catering was excellent, the welcome from the local community was wonderful, and the good company a credit to County Tipperary.

MHTI Avoca Fieldtrip Sat/Sun 8-9 June 2013

This fieldtrip is primarily aimed at completing the Avoca Mines site inventory which we started in March 2012 under the able direction of Alastair Lings.

The areas covered over the two days will include Ballymoneen in West Avoca with its Engine House and shaft. In East Avoca the area around Connary with its shafts, mine buildings and surviving chimney stack, Old workings at Kilmacoo will also be looked at. The Shroughmore ropeway line and its supports from the Avonmore River to Connary will also be covered, including a short pause at the adit where Avoca's lost Swedish Miners are buried. Depending on weather conditions and progress over the two days, there may be time for some discussion on the possibility of finding evidence of ancient mining activity in the valley. This aspect has never been addressed at Avoca in spite of 19th century references to ancient tools etc being discovered in old workings and the presence of several bronze age sites in the area.

Lisheen Mine, Co. Tipperary

A man was killed on the afternoon of the 4th April. He had been driving a loader when it was hit by falling rock. Paramedics pronounced him dead at the scene, but due to the locally unstable condition of the mine, the body could not be recovered for 55 hours. Mario Francis, 49, from the Philippines had worked in the mine for 12 years and lived in Urlingford. He leaves a wife, My-Ann, their sons Jomar and Jolrem, and children from a previous marriage Julemar and Mario (Junior). Mine rescue in Sligo

A woman had a lucky escape after she plunged 10 metres down an abandoned mine shaft. The drama unfolded on Sligo's iconic Ben Bulben when the 53-year-old woman — a holidaymaker out hiking with friends — entered an abandoned Barytes mineral mine in the Glencarbury area at the top of the mountain. The mine entrance was formerly boarded up but the hoarding had recently been removed by vandals.

After entering the mine area, the woman stumbled and plunged down the mine shaft, falling around 10 metres into waist-high icy water. The accident happened at around 2.30pm yesterday, Sunday. The Independent reported that the woman was uninjured in the fall but was extremely shocked and was unable to swim. One of her walking companions managed to get down into the shaft and pull her on to a ledge. The group of hikers did not have any ropes with them but telephoned the emergency services for immediate assistance. Luckily, a local walking club with several former rescue workers and a doctor among them was in the vicinity and, working quickly, managed to help. A coastguard helicopter operating out of Malin Head returning from an earlier rescue was dispatched to the scene.

The Sligo Leitrim Mountain Rescue team was contacted and they sent out a rapid-response team. With the aid of two local farmers who ferried vital

equipment to the top of Ben Bulben using quad bikes over a very steep and precarious track, the rescue workers were able to get to the location quickly. "It was a very urgent rescue and time was of the essence," said Mountain Rescue team leader Conal Sexton. With the Sligo Sikorsky helicopter, Rescue 118, on stand-by at the scene, the rescue workers managed to get the woman out of the mine shaft using a rope-harness system. The entire operation lasted for around one

hour. The woman was found to be suffering serious injuries to her leg, severe hypothermia and shock was lifted to safety and flown directly to Sligo Regional Hospital at around 3pm. The rescue workers remained at the scene until 7pm to ensure that all those helping had safely reached the bottom of Ben Bulben.

Mining Records in the Guildhall Library, London (part 2)

Newsletter 58 (November 2012) included a list of prospectuses held by the Guildhall Library that were issued from 1824-1901, by companies mining or quarrying in Ireland. The list below is derived from the Librarys "Loan & Company Prospectuses Index 1902 - 1939/40", which may exclude the years 1916, 1917, 1918 and 1932 due to conservation work. Again, I have listed companies that I thought had an irish connection. Companies became more international in outlook, and it is harder to spot the connections. For example the Eileen Alannah Mining Company Limited (1911) operated in Rhodesia (Zambia / Zimbabwe), while the North British Aluminium Company had a works in Larne, Co. Antrim. There may be omissions from the list, perhaps the Liverpool Barytes Company Ltd.

Valuation Revision Books



OTHER NEWS

Llan Colliery, Cardiff, South Wales (06/12/2012)

Villagers in Gwaelod-y-Garth have made a plaque to commemorate the lives of the 16 men and boys who lost their lives in an explosion in the local colliery in 1875. A subsequent enquiry recommended that coal dust was watered down, to reduce the risk of explosion: a practice that continues to this day. Aberpergwn Mine, South Wales (08/01/2013)

Production has been halted at the colliery, and 290 people have lost their jobs. 20 staff will remain to carry out maintenance and development work.

Treffry Viaduct, Cornwall (09/01/2013)

The Treffry Viaduct was built between 1839 and 1842 to carry china clay, copper, and granite on a tramway over the River Par. The viaduct is 89 feet high and 650 feet long with 10 arches. A specialist contractor will remove vegetation from the structure.

Winsford Mine, Cheshire (16/01/2013)

The Salt Union, owners of the Winsford Mine, are worried that methane from a nearby underground gas storage facility could seep into the mine and pose a danger to employees. The facility is being developed by Storengy just 800 metres from the mine. There are currently 7 UK underground gas storage sites.

Sirius Minerals PLC, North Yorkshire (31/01/2013)

The company has submitted a planning application for a potash mine in the North York Moors National Park. The mine will be located south of Whitby, with potash transferred to Teeside by a 27 km long pipeline. It is expected that the National Park Authority will determine the application in May 2013. Hargreaves Services are hoping to develop a surface mine near West Rainton in Co. Durham. They hope to extract 500 000 t of coal over a 2-3 year period. The proposal may create 40 jobs.

In 2009 UK Coal received permission to recover up to 1 Mt of coal fines from the spoil of this former colliery which shut in 2002. The Scottish Environment Protection Agency has approved Scottish Coals application to drain Loch Fitty. The company wants to extend the existing St Ninians Surface Mine to extract 3.4 Mt of coal over a period of six years, from below the loch. UK Coal hopes to develop a surface mine near Bignall End, producing 450 000 t of coal from an 80 hectare site over a period of 2½ years. In 1895 about 80 miners died at Diglake Colliery and most of the bodies were never recovered. The proposed opencast will be only 20m deep, with the site of the disaster some 145m below that. Wheal Watkins Mine, City of Burnside, S Australia (18/03/2013)

Burnside Historical Society want Burnside Council to fund a third study into restoring access to the old Wheal Watkins Mine in Glen Osmond. The mine was the first metal mine in Australia, producing silver and lead from 1843-1851. Tours of the mine started in 1986, but the mine was closed by a rockfall in 2005.
